

Lenten Series 2016

Wednesday Evenings following the five-thirty Service and Soup Supper February 17 & 24 and March 2 & 9 Programs begin at 6:30

No single event in human history has received more attention than the suffering and crucifixion of Jesus of Nazareth. In this Lenten journey, Adam Hamilton guides us through the last twenty-four hours of Jesus' life through a video filmed in the Holy Land. His book may be purchased on Amazon or through Cokesbury but is not necessary to enjoy the program. Each chapter is designed to help the reader experience and understand the significance of Jesus' suffering and death in a way you have never done before.



When is Happening?

A Party, Lots of Wine and a Miracle

The following is a copy of my sermon from January 17th. It is intended as a heartfelt "thank you" for the incredible anniversary celebration you honored me with and also the many gracious expressions given to Lori and me over the holidays. Many thanks. It is an honor to be your Rector. The sermon is based on the gospel reading, John 2:1-11; the story of Jesus' first miracle at a wedding in Cana of Galilee.

I'm not even going to pretend I've got a sermon for this morning.

This isn't a day for "sermonating." This is a day for thanksgiving.

Today, is the 61st annual meeting of Holy Nativity Episcopal Church. We did the business part of that between services. (And if you're visiting with us today and some of this doesn't make sense or seems more like a family conversation, I apologize. But if nothing else, maybe you'll come to know what an incredible, healthy and dynamic parish this is).

But I've got to talk about Wednesday night. I am blown away, overwhelmed, humbled, grateful and in a weird way feeling pretty inadequate from the incredible celebration of our 10th anniversary together. I can't begin to thank you or to thank all who made it happen because truly with the exception of what was shared with me, it was a surprise.

Thank you for the service, your gifts, notes and cards, the wonderful party afterwards, everything was beyond my imagination. And thank you seems so inadequate.

But I truly believe that gratitude is an expression of God's presence; a presence that is so vividly on display in this parish. And here's something I believe with all my heart. Thanksgiving is an expression

of how much we depend on God and each other. It is recognizing how much we have received from God

and from the people around us. And I hope you heard what Bishop Russell had to say in his remarks. Thanksgiving comes from the trust and friendship that is so prevalent in our lives together.

And it says a lot about us.

Saying thank you recognizes that we are in a relationship with each other; that we're tethered to other people who travel with us along the way. It's an acknowledgement that we can't go it alone and what we accomplish comes through the commitment we have to each other and to God.

Ten years is a long time. Thank you for celebrating it. But what's happened in the last ten years is not because of me. That's not trying to be humble. I really believe that. What's happened in the past ten years is because of a true and sacred commitment by everyone here to the kingdom of God in this place we call home.

And the belief that just maybe the world and God's kingdom needs a place like us.

Look at our facilities that are beautiful and second to none. It feels like church. I celebrate and give thanks for so many who made this happen. I look at the ministries happening now in this place both public and behind the scenes. And I celebrate and give thanks. I thank God that we are living out the challenge of Jesus Christ that what we do until one of the least of these we do for him. I celebrate and thank God for our youth and children's programs, our music ministry, our joy in worship. I remember a visitor not long ago who was a life long Episcopalian and told me after church that in all her life she'd never experienced such an atmosphere in the Episcopal Church. I thanked her but told her I was pretty sure it was the Holy Spirit.

And you know it.

The presence of God in this place is palpable. All because when Jesus has knocked on the doors of our lives, we have opened that door with joy and let him in.

Folks, What we do here matters. What happens here for many makes all the difference in the world. The kingdom of God is here; among us. May we never settle for just being a church.

And I am so grateful to be a part.

Now it's not lost on me that today's gospel lesson has to do with a big party, a lot of wine and most importantly a miracle. The big party and lots a wine reminds me a whole lot of Wednesday night.

But the miracle.

Well, just look around you. The miracle is that in all the paths we take in life and all the people who share our journey that God has chosen to bring us all together for the past 10 years. Blessed people of God as different as we can be but who together have allowed God to use us to make a difference in this world.

And may that celebration never end.
