Adult Confirmation Class HNEC Panama City March 2020


LOVING

Good morning! This is our annual combination of regular Adult Sunday School class with Confirmation Class.

We will have three sessions here in the Library where we gather for an hour every Sunday morning between services. Each session will begin with Bible discussion, acknowledging our first priority; then Confirmation! The fourth Sunday on March 29 will be with Father Steve in the church for his Instructed Eucharist.

I'll introduce myself so you know you who I am, and then we'll talk about Holy Nativity Episcopal Church, Panama City and our ministries here. Our Episcopal **Diocese** of the Central Gulf Coast led by Bishop Russell Kendrick, who'll visit Sunday, May 10 for Confirmation. Our Episcopal Church led by Presiding Bishop Michael Curry, whom you may have met when he was here after Hurricane Michael. The Episcopal Church is the American province of the worldwide Anglican Communion, led by Archbishop Justin Welby, with headquarters in London, England.

Born September 14, 1935 here in Panama City, Florida, my name is Thomas Carroll Weller, Jr. but that's not who I am, I am Bubba to family and whoever knew me before age 6, Carroll to those who knew me from 6 to 18. Tom ever since. Father Tom if you prefer. Linda Peters Weller is here, we married June 1957 here at Holy Nativity, the first wedding in this church. Linda's family and my family were charter members, with ten families who came from St Andrew's Episcopal Church at the bishop's request to form Holy Nativity in 1955.



We have three children Malinda, Joe and Cathlyn plus granddaughter Kristen, whom I adopted when she was very young, so four children. Counting Kristen again, we have five grandchildren, one great grandchild.

I went to Cove School 1941-1949 (which is now Holy Nativity Episcopal School) and Bay High class of 1953. The 7th or 8th Episcopal priest I know of in the Weller family, I always knew I was going to seminary, even declared it at age ten. But when a sophomore at Univ of Florida, I changed my mind and major from pre-Theology to Business Administration. At graduation Spring 1957 I went into the Navy, as my alternative to the draft and mainly because I was not sure what I wanted in life. Loving my first Navy sea duty, a destroyer, I stayed 20 years, retiring in 1978 as Commander. We were settled in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania.

My additional education includes MBA fUniversity of Michigan; U S Naval War College, Newport, RI; Lutheran Theological Seminary, Gettysburg PA.

Upon retirement from the U S Navy in 1978, I started and ran my own

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defense consulting business and taught graduate courses as adjunct professor in Political Science at Univ of West Florida. Linda and I were very active in our Pennsylvania parish, and I was studying in the Deacon program with our bishop's diocesan school. One morning my rector called me to his office to confront me with "Two Cadillacs are enough: how long are you going to ignore God's call on your life?" Quite literally I threw up my hands and said "Oh what the hell, I give up". He then turned and phoned the bishop, and I was inducted into "the process" leading to ordination

On my 45th birthday I started at Lutheran Theological Seminary, Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, where my bishop kindly arranged for me to study so we would not have to move from our home in Harrisburg to Sewanee or elsewhere.


On ordination, wanting to come home to Florida, I sought and was called to be priest at Trinity Episcopal Church, Apalachicola. We were there 14 years and I retired from parish ministry in 1998. In retirement, I've served as Priest Associate at Holy Nativity with Fr John Richardson. Priest at Grace Episcopal Church, Panama City Beach. Priest Associate at Holy Nativity again, with Fr Arnold Bush. Chaplain & Religion Teacher at Holy Nativity Episcopal School for several years. Priest at St Thomas Episcopal Church, Laguna Beach for five years. Priest Associate back here at Holy Nativity, this my the third time, since

May 2009, being now soon eleven years back here at HNEC.

One 2009 day Father Steve phoned me in my office at St Thomas and graciously invited me to come back to Holy Nativity. We agreed that as Priest Associate, I'm responsible for adult Christian education, which I like best. I lead the Adult Sunday school class. I have oversight of the EfM program when we have that here. I'm on the preaching schedule as assigned, about one Sunday in three or four. I serve as Supply Priest when Father Steve is away. Except for ordinary kindness, I have no pastoral duties. I do no pastoral counseling. Except as Fr Steve may ask, or unless he's away, I do not make hospital visits or home visits. I may assist or officiate funerals. I officiate weddings from time to time as requested, for that I do my own premarital counseling (and asking the bishop's permission as required when marriage after divorce). I do not attend Vestry meetings. I may serve as Supply Priest at other parishes in the area as I wish (seldom anymore). Retired clergy, I do not go to diocesan events or clergy conferences. I have an office here at the church, where I sometimes work, though I do not have office hours. I do enjoy visiting in my office with most anyone who asks to meet with me, though never as pastoral counseling.

Episcopal is NT Greek word for Overseer or Bishop, so-named because we are governed by bishops, who are elected by people of the diocese and confirmed by the Episcopal Church at large. Our bishop is personable and informal, and you may call him "Bishop" or "Russell". He visits each parish at least annually, and is scheduled to be at Holy Nativity on Sunday, May 10, 2020 for "Episcopal visitation" and Confirmation.

A branch of the Jesus People, TEC came out of the Church of England along with the English colonization of North America and the founding of the United States. Organized into provinces and dioceses, TEC is governed by General Convention: bicameral House of Bishops (each diocese elects its own bishop) headed by the Presiding Bishop and House of Deputies headed by elected President (delegates are elected by each diocese, four lay and four clergy from each diocese). Meets every three years in designated locations. General Convention's program is carried out by the Executive Council under the Presiding Bishop. Part of the Western Church that evolved from the 1054 AD Great Schism (splitting) of Christianity over then current issues, the Anglican Communion is one of the world's largest Christian communities. It has tens of millions of members in more than 165 countries around the globe. Anglicanism is one of the traditions or expressions of Christian faith. Others include Roman Catholicism, Eastern Orthodox, Lutheran and Baptist, Presbyterian, Methodist, and so on.

The Anglican Communion is organised into a series of provinces and

extra- provincial areas. The provinces are subdivided into dioceses, and the dioceses into parishes. There are 40 provinces and, from March 2019, five extra-provincial areas:

Food Bank

Holy Nativity has an active Food Bank where parishioners bring donated food for distribution to local organizations who give to the needy in the community.

Supper At Grace

Holy Nativity supports this ministry of Grace Episcopal Church, which is located in Panama City Beach. The second Thursday of every month we volunteer to cook and serve dinner to the needy at Grace.

Veteran's Day Service

Every year during the week of Veteran's Day, Holy Nativity Episcopal School and Church honors our Veterans at a school chapel service.

English Tea and Fashion Show

Every year we present our English Tea and Fashion Show in the spring. This is always a popular event and all the proceeds go toward charities in the community.

Angel Tree

Every year during Advent, we have an Angel Tree with names from a local nursing home with their Christmas wish list. The wrapped gifts are then delivered to them for their Christmas party.

Advent Outreach Family

Every year during Advent, Holy Nativity collects donations for a family in need from the community. The youth group goes out and shops, wraps, and delivers the gifts.

Laundry Love

Several times a year parishioners give their quarters and volunteer at a local laundry mat to provide assistance in cleaning clothes for the needy.

Holy Nativity Episcopal School

HNES has been part of Holy Nativity Episcopal Church since 1959. The school offers education for grades 3K through 8th grade. The church will always be in partnership with the school and in making sure that Panama City has a wonderful God filled opportunity of education.

Lay Ministries

The ministries of Holy Nativity touch the hearts of each and every parishioner and visitor that walk through our doors. There are many opportunities to become part of our church life here and participate in one of these groups. We encourage you to prayerfully consider sharing your God-given talent and become a lay ministry leader. If you have any questions please call the church office.

Fellowship and Food

Supper Club: Twice a year a supper club mixer is held and everyone is placed in a supper club group. Your group will

meet once a month at a person's home or at a restaurant. This is a great way to meet new people and find out more about your fellow parishioners.

Book Club: Once a month the church's Book Club meets at Panera Bread for dinner and then they move to the Parish House/Office where they discussed the selected book of the month.

Annual Meeting: An annual celebration of the parish held each January.

Wednesday Night Programs: Every Wednesday from Sept. to May we have our *fivethirty* Casual Eucharist followed by supper and activities are adults, children, and youth.

SummerTime: During the summer months on Wednesday nights we plan a more parishioner led event with Evening prayer and supper (planned menu with the food brought by everyone).

Shell Island Sunday:

Once a year in the summer we worship on Shell Island! Everyone comes on their boat or rides the ferry. We enjoy Eucharist, a picnic, and time together in outdoors and the water.

Play Group: Join this group of young parents and their babies and toddlers as they have a play day at the church.

The Celebration

Committee: These ladies organize special receptions for example, wedding and baby showers.

Administration Finance Committee: Quarterly meeting reviewing financial statements of the Church. Convention Delegate: for Annual Diocesan Convention. Vestry: the governing/advisory board of the parish. Tablecloths Ministry: to take home cloth tablecloths for cleaning and return.

Archives Committee: Organizes and keeps Holy Nativity's history.

Evangelism Newcomers Ministry:

This ministry helps to welcome all visitors and new members every Sunday morning and with followup. Different areas are listed below.

***Welcome Table: Every Sunday volunteers are incharge of the welcome table. It is supplied with information for both visitors and members. ***Newcomer's Social: Socials are planned throughout the year to welcome our new members to Holy Nativity and this gives them a chance to meet us and learn about their new church home.

<u>Worship</u>

Chancel Choir: The adult choir currently sings at the 10:30 am service and at special services during the year. Rehearsal is on Thursday nights at 6:30 pm. **Rite One Choir:** This adult choir currently sings at the 8:00 am service and at special services during the year. Rehearsals are on Thursday nights at 5:30 pm.

Children's Choir: The children's choir sings often on Sunday mornings at the 10:30 service and at other special occasions.

Instrumentalists: to assist in our musical offerings during the year. Organ Guild: to assist and be apart of a committee that maintains our organ.

Acolytes: Acolytes are youth and adults that assist in worship by carrying torches and the cross while processing, recessing, and during the reading of the Holy Gospel. They assist during in the offertory and with Eucharist. This is an important ministry that is needed during our time of worship.

Lay Eucharistic Ministers/Chalice Bearers: Chalice Bearers are licensed by the Bishop, and they assist the Priest during worship by helping with different parts of the service including serving communion. They are also trained as Lav **Eucharistic Ministers** where they can provide communion to the homebound and sick that are unable to attend a worship service. Lectors: Lectors are parishioners who are scheduled to read the First Lesson at the 10:30 am service.

Greeters: Greeters are parishioners who are scheduled to assist the ushers at both worship services to welcome everyone and introduce newcomers and visitors to the Priest.

Ushers: Ushers are parishioners who are scheduled to assist in the worship services by taking attendance, passing around the offering plates, & guiding the congregation during communion. Altar Guild: The Altar

Guild is responsible for setting up the Altar area

for any service in the church, including decoration for church holidays and putting out our bulletins.

Nursery: The nursery is open on Sundays 7:45 am to 12:00 noon and during other events and meetings that are scheduled. We have a preschool, toddler, and infant area..

Children's Chapel: The children through 5th grade have their own chapel service during the 10:30 am worship service on Sunday mornings where they can listen and learn in their own way. They begin worship with their parents in the Nave and recess out after the children's story. They return during the announcement time of the service.

Flower Guild: A new ministry providing flowers for services and parish events.

Pastoral Care

Lay Eucharistic Ministers: They are licensed by the bishop the same as Chalice Bearers.

They are trained to provide Communion to people who are unable to attend a worship service due to illness or who is homebound. Feed My Sheep: Meals are made by the ladies of the church and are delivered to the sick. people recovering from illness, families with new babies, and when there is a death in the family. Mary-Martha Circle of The Episcopal Community: The Episcopal Community was formed in Feb. 2010 by women from around the country to share their spiritual journeys and mutually encourage each others faith. The Order of Daughters of the King: This lay order is open to all baptized Anglican women

baptized Anglican women who take vows of Daily Prayer and Service. The DOK meet once a month to serve our local parish and to pray for the spread of god's Kingdom, our pastors, the needs of our church, it's parishioners, and their loved ones. **Cursillo:** A diocesan three-day "renewal retreat" of learning, worship and formation.



In the first century Jesus of Nazareth inspired a movement. A community of people whose lives were centered on Jesus Christ and committed to living the way of God's unconditional, unselfish. sacrificial, and redemptive love.

Before they were called "church" or "Christian," this Jesus Movement was simply called "the way."




Today I believe our vocation is to live as the Episcopal branch of the Jesus Movement. But how can we together grow more deeply with Jesus Christ at the center of our lives, so we can bear witness to his way of love in and for the world?

The deep roots of our Christian tradition may offer just such a path. For centuries, monastic communities have shaped their lives around rhythms and disciplines for following Jesus together. Such a pattern is known as a "Rule of Life." The framework you now hold – **The Way of Love: Practices for Jesus-Centered Life** – outlines a Rule for the Episcopal branch of the Jesus Movement.

It is designed to be spare and spacious, so that individuals, ministry groups, congregations, and networks can flesh it out in unique ways and build a church-wide treasure trove of stories and resources. There is no specific order you need to follow. If you already keep a Rule or spiritual disciplines, you might reflect and discover how that path intersects with this one. By entering into reflection, discernment and commitment around the practices of Turn -Learn - Pray - Worship - Bless - Go - Rest, I pray we will grow as communities following the loving, liberating, life-giving way of Jesus. His way has the power to change each of our lives and to change this world.


PROVINCES OF THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH, SHOWING EACH DIOCESE. WE ARE IN PROVINCE IV.




